Homework and spellings

This week, the children have received home learning: a grammar activity on nouns and noun phrases; a short reading comprehension and a maths activity linked to their place value learning.

This year, the way we are teaching spelling is changing. Each week, the children will come home with a new spelling rule and various activities to support that rule. We are no longer sending home 10 words for the children to learn but instead we will be teaching a rule at school, sending the rule home with various activities and then testing the children on five unseen words that follow that rule. In addition to this, the children will be tested on a further five words which will revise previously taught rules through school.

In order to support your child at home, the new spelling rule will be shared via the weekly newsletter. In some weeks, we will focus on 10 statutory words, which don't follow a rule and must just be learned.

<u>This week's spelling rule:</u> is ough spelling. Here is a picture of some examples:
